Secretary-Treasurer Zimmerman reported the Commission is in compliance with its policies and earned a .28% return, which is above the Commission's benchmark.

 - 2. Legislative Update

General Counsel Gardner handed out a report of the 2013 session of the Maryland General Assembly. This report presented bi-county legislation and bills, the M-NCPPC's position, and the result/status of each. Mr. Gardner highlighted some areas relevant to M-NCPPC.

- HB 472 Local Government Article: A recodification of Article 28 and 66B. (Passed)
- HB 409/SB 412 Land Use Comprehensive Planning and Zoning Cycle: On a given cycle, each planning agency in the state considers changing their comprehensive plans. Prince George's and Montgomery Counties refer to this plan as the General Plan. (Passed)
- HB 372/SB 202 Recordation and Transfer Taxes Transfer of Property Between Regulated Entities - Exemption: This bill will have a minor impact on the total available transfer taxes that are used for Program Open Space. (Passed)
- HB 896/SB 877 Program Open Space Use of Funds Artificial Turf Surfaces: This bill prohibits the use of Program Open Space funding for synthetic turf surfaces. (Failed)
- HB 635 MC/PG 102-13 MNCPPC Restrictions on Commissioners from Montgomery County: This bill would have repealed the requirement that not more than three Commissioners of the Commission from Montgomery County be members of the same political party. (Withdrawn)
- HB 637 MC/PG 101-13 MNCPPC High Performance Buildings: This bill was initially drafted to apply to WSSC. It required certain green-building technologies when constructing and renovating Commission-owned buildings. (Passed)
- HB 639 MC/PG111-13 MNCPPC Boundaries City of Laurel: This bill excludes the entire City of Laurel from the Maryland-Washington Regional District as it will have existed on July 1, 2013. (Passed)

ADDITIONAL ANNOUNCEMENTS

Commissioner Bailey commended the Prince George's Department of Parks & Recreation on an exceedingly well done job with Seat Pleasant Day, Hillcrest Heights Day, Suitland Day, and the

Harlem Renaissance Day. Chair Hewlett noted performers from the various events also gave positive feedback.

Chair Hewlett and Vice Chair Carrier thanked everyone who worked on the FY2014 Budget.

Vice Chair Carrier announced the Montgomery County Planning Department forwarded a redraft of the entire zoning ordinance to the County Council, which has been a four year project. Vice Chair Carrier announced Woodstock Equestrian Park, located on more than 600 acres of land, recently opened in Montgomery County.

Executive Director Barney introduced Curtis Johnson a new employee of the Corporate Policy and Management Services Division.

The regular meeting of the Board of Trustees convened in the ERS/Merit Board Conference Room on Tuesday, May 7, 2013 at 10:00 a.m. Voting members present were: Josh Ardison, Patricia Colihan Barney, Richard H. Presentation by David N. Levine

i. Mandatory Ethics and Fiduciary Responsibility Training

Item 4 was delayed to the end of the meeting to allow time for all participants to arrive.

David N. Levine conducted the annual Ethics and Fiduciary Responsibility Training that covered the Duty of Loyalty, the Duty to Act Prudently, Procedural Prudence, the Duty to Diversify, the Duty to Follow Governing Documents, Prohibited Transactions, Fiduciary Prohibitions, Conflicts of Interest and Transactions Involving Gifts/Kickbacks.

5. COMMITTEE REPORTS/RECOMMENDATIONS

DR. BUCHER presented the regular report for the Administration & Personnel Oversight Committee ("Personnel Committee") meeting of April 16, 2013.

The FY2014 Proposed Operating Budget was reviewed and a final recommendation was postponed until the Personnel Committee's May 21, 2013 meeting.

Following review of the NCPERS Best Governance Practices for Public Retirement Systems, the Personnel Committee recommended staff develop a list of contracts, summaries of policies and guidelines and a mission statement. In researching best practices, Staff discovered many retirement agencies have a Governance or Policy Manual that incorporates the statutory authority, mission and value statement, board governance, various policies and procedures, and committee charters into one governing document. The Personnel Committee agreed a Governance or Policy Manual would be beneficial to trustees, staff and the members of the plan.

The ERS' Procurement Policy and Procedures Manual ("Policy") requires a competitive proposal process for all professional services over \$25,000 every five (5) years unless noted in the Exceptions Section of the Policy. The Personnel Committee discussed the requirement of a competitive process for legal services and noted that the Groom Law Group recently drafted the new plan design language and reviewed several new alternative investment manager agreements. The Personnel Committee agreed that the long-term relationship and institutional knowledge the Groom Law Group has with staff and trustees is essential for efficient operation and maintenance of the tax qualified status. As a result, the Personnel Committee recommended adding "Legal Services" to the Exceptions Section of the Policy. It was noted the Commission does not require competitive bidding every five (5) years for legal services.

DR. BUCHER made a motion, seconded by MS. WALSH to approve the Revised Procurement Policy and Procedures Manual which includes the addition of "Legal Services" under the Exceptions Section. The motion PASSED unanimously (8-0). (Motion #13-19)

DR. BUCHER made a motion, seconded by MS. BARNEY to approve continuation of the Legal Services Agreement with the Groom Law Group. The motion PASSED unanimously (8-0). (Motion #13-20)

DR. BUCHER, in MS. BARNEY's absence at the March 19, 2013 meeting, presented the regular report for the Investment Monitoring Group (IMG) meeting of March 19, 2013.

MR. AFZAL arrived at 10:14 a.m.

The IMG conducted a performance review of Oaktree Capital Management's PPIP Private Fund, L.P. and Opportunities Fund VIII, L.P. and discussed Wilshire's Manager Review of Capital Guardian.

Staff provided the IMG a detailed report of the implementation tasks required for the revised asset allocation approved March 6, 2012. Target allocations were adopted over a 12-month period based on market liquidity and the Board manager selection process. Implementation of the new target allocations involved coordinating with the Groom Law Group, the M-NCPPC's Legal Department, Global Transition Solutions, Wilshire Associates, Northern Trust, and multiple investment managers. The majority of primary tasks were completed within the 12-month target. Completion of the remaining tasks is anticipated by June 2013.

MS. BARNEY presented the regular report for the IMG meeting of April 16, 2013.

The IMG reviewed the revised and new investment guidelines prepared by Wilshire Associates for the Earnest Partners China Fund, State Street Global Advisors, Wilshire MNCPPC Global, L.P., Flag Real Assets Partners III, L.P., and Western Asset Global Multi-Sector, LLC. Earnest Partners' Investment Guidelines were revised to allow for use of the Earnest Partners China Fund and allow Earnest Partners to maintain securities that screen for Sudan involvement after the initial purchase.

DR. BUCHER made a motion, seconded by MS. BARNEY to approve the revised investment guidelines for Earnest Partners and the new investment guidelines for State Street Global Advisors, Wilshire MNCPPC Global, L.P., Flag Real Assets Partners III, L.P., and Western Asset Global Multi-Sector, LLC, as prepared by Wilshire Associates. The motion PASSED unanimously (9-0). (Motion #13-21) The IMG discussed with Mike Dudkowski an excerpt from Wilshire's 2012 Active Management Review which focused on small cap growth and detailed the disappointing short-and long-term results for small cap growth equity. The data showed a benchmark that performed well versus the universe of active managers. Investors needed to have a top quartile manager in small cap growth in order to beat the benchmark from the period December 31, 2005-2012. Given the data, the IMG discussed the probability of picking a top quartile manager that would remain a top quartile manager and whether the small cap growth allocation should be indexed. Mr. Dudkowski supported the IMG's decision to engage an active or passive manager in this space. The IMG recommended the Board engage a passive small cap growth investment manager.

DR. BUCHER made a motion, seconded by MS. BARNEY to approve the engagement of a passive small cap growth investment manager. The motion PASSED unanimously (9-0). (Motion #13-22)

MS. BARNEY reported that Oaktree Capital Management is offering a new Real Estate Debt Fund which seeks to generate attractive returns and income by combining a diversified portfolio of real estate debt investments (CMBS, first mortgages, subordinated secured debt, mezzanine debt and corporate debt). Oaktree Capital Management was asked to present at the Board's June 4, 2013 meeting.

The IMG discussed Wilshire's Manager Reviews for C.S. McKee Core Fixed Income and Loomis Sayles High Yield.

MS. BARNEY discussed options for monitoring Wilshire Private Markets Group. The IMG determined the next step was to explore with Wilshire Consulting how it would handle monitoring Wilshire Private Markets; how performance would be measured; and, how Wilshire Consulting would address the appearance of a conflict of interest.

C. Audit Committee

Presentation by Committee Chairman, Barbara Walsh

MS. WALSH presented the regular report for the Audit Committee's meeting of April 16, 2013.

The Audit Committee met with CliftonLarsonAllen's Thomas Rey, Engagement Partner, and Heather Plitt, Engagement Director, regarding the engagement scope, work plan, critical audit areas, timing of work and a few upcoming issues were discussed. CliftonLarsonAllen will be available to assist the ERS staff with the new disclosure requirements. The final audit report is scheduled for completion in September 2013.

A. Administrator's Report dated April 25, 2013 Presentation by Administrator, Andrea L. Rose

Andrea Rose presented the Administrator's Report dated April 25, 2013.

The ERS received the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting Award from the Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada for its Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) for fiscal year ended June 30, 2012. The Certificate MINUTES, AS SUBMITTED, AT THE JUNE 4, 2013 REGULAR BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETING (DRAFT) of Achievement is the highest form of recognition in the area of governmental accounting and financial reporting, and its attainment represents a significant accomplishment by a government and its management. Sheila Joynes, Accounting Manager was recognized for leading the CAFR team.

ERS staff is conducting On-Site Workshops, One-on-One Counseling and in-service training sessions throughout the Commission. More than 142 members have benefit from these programs in 2013. These programs have become extremely popular and six onsite sessions have been scheduled for the fall of 2013. SUBJECT: FY2014 Operating Budget

RECOMMENDATION

The Board of Trustees ("Board") of the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission ("Commission") Employees' Retirement System ("ERS") respectfully submits the FY2014 Operating Budget for approval. The budget provides for comprehensive services and communications in the administration of the Commission's primary retirement program.

The FY2014 Operating Budget totals \$1,643,750. Compared to the FY13 Amended Budget, the FY14 Operating Budget is a 1.8% decrease.

BACKGROUND

The Commission established the ERS effective July 1, 1972, in accordance with the Trust Agreement between the Commission and the ERS' Board. The Board's primary responsibility is to administer the ERS for the sole benefit of the members in order to pay the promised benefits.

Annually, the Board prepares and presents an operating budget setting forth projected expenditures for the operation of the ERS for the Commission's review and approval. The Board also prepares certain projected expenses, including banking, investment consulting and investment manager fees for the Commission's information. The Board monitors closely the fees and expenses from consultants and professional advisors to ensure comparability to other public funds of the ERS' size and complexity.

Although there is no formal restriction or budget guideline imposed by parties outside the Board, the Board is sensitive to the limitations imposed on the Commission by the two counties.

Historically, administrative expenses were equal to 1% of estimated covered payroll and the ERS consistently maintained its budget within this expense assumption. As the Commission payroll was reduced through management restructuring, the amount available for budget consideration using the 1% expense assumption decreased as work program requirements increased making it difficult to effectively manage the ERS' work program. After considerable analysis, at its February 5, 2013 meeting, the Board approved an operating budget each year based exclusively on the ERS' fiscal work program requirements which is consistent with other local retirement systems.

ANALYSIS

Staff examined each expenditure category and its funding. The FY2014 Operating Budget (Attachment 1) proposes overall spending at \$1,643,750 based on the work program requirements reflected below. The FY2014 Operating Budget is a decrease of 1.8% in spending from FY2013 to FY2014.

Personnel Services

Total Personnel Services are estimated to increase from FY2013 by 3.3%.

Authorized Positions

The ERS staff consists of eight career positions: the Administrator, six full-time and one part-time position. The position that supports the High Line Pension Administration System has been a part-time position budgeted at 30 hours per week or 75% full-time. During the latter part of FY2012 and FY2013, this position worked full-time with a work program including both the regular tasks of application support and additional tasks of implementing new plan design changes. In FY2014, this position will continue implementing plan design changes and will support the interface tasks required for the Commission's ERP project. Given the ongoing complexity of the pension administration system, this position is being converted from part-time to full-time effective July 1, 2013.

Employee Compensation

The FY14 Operating Budget includes plans for annual increases and cost-of-living adjustments. ERS employees have not received an annual salary or cost-of-living adjustment since July 1, 2009. Staff received a one-time \$2,000 bonus payment in FY2013. Employee compensation will follow suit with non-represented Commission employees.

Employee Benefits

Pension costs are increasing by 29.6% in FY2014 from 15.6% to 20.21% for the six employees in the defined benefit plan. Pension costs remain flat at 8% for the two employees in the ICMA 401(a) plan. Health insurance and OPEB costs are projected to increase by 10% and 7.5%, respectively.

Other Services & Charges

This category nets to an overall decrease of 13.3% and includes professional services (actuarial, auditing, and legal); education and training; insurance (fiduciary, general liability and a fidelity bond); and miscellaneous services (printing, rent, copier and software maintenance fees).

Actuarial Services

Actuarial services are projected at \$50,000 and include funding for the annual actuarial valuation, actuarial deficiency calculations for transfers, board and staff training, and an actuarial analysis of the effect of GASB Statement No. 67, *Financial Reporting for Pension Plans* and Statement No. 68, *Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions*.

Auditing/Tax Services

Auditing/Tax Services are projected at \$34,000 and include funding for the annual audit, tax advice related to the ERS' alternative investments, and assistance in navigating the filing and disclosure requirements for the ERS' international investments.

Legal Services

The Board continues to contract with outside pension law specialists, the Groom Law Group of Washington, D.C. Fees are projected at \$95,000 and include issues related to the new and existing alternative investment structures, electronic communication with plan members, complex plan issues and maintenance of the ERS' tax qualified status and preparation and submission of the IRS Determination Letter Application.

Computer Consulting

Computer Consulting includes \$50,000 for plan design enhancements to the pension software that were budgeted but may not be completed in FY2013. The cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) modifications are more complicated than anticipated and implementation is expected to carry into FY2014. The modifications affect all members retiring after July 1, 2012. The calculation requires a set of accumulated service 'buckets' be set up solely for the calculation of the COLA benefit. The pension system needs to accept two separate sick leave values, and incorporate those values into the future COLA calculation. These values also need to be reported annually to the actuary for proper valuation of future benefits. These changes cannot adversely affect the calculation of total service for retirement eligibility purposes. The most complicated part of the calculation is the recalculation of the benefit at the stepdown for Social Security. The new COLA calculation affects how the annual COLA increase is applied at the custodial bank, Northern Trust. In the past, the bank was able to apply a straight percentage increase to the current benefit amount. Now that the percent value is based on service, the increase must be calculated by the ERS and sent as an update file to Northern Trust. This requires additional work and lead-time on the part of ERS staff. The COLA modification has been the most difficult to estimate because of the inherent complexity and the volume of situations that must be tested.

It is unknown at this time if the ERS will incur additional fees with Northern Trust because the retiree COLA cannot be processed as a general percentage increase. Additional staff time is required to create a special file for Northern Trust with an earlier deadline. The COLA for July 1, 2013 is 2.1%; therefore, Northern Trust can apply the general percentage increase as in years past. If the COLA had been above 2.5%, additional calculations would have been required by staff.

Education & Training

The Board continues its commitment to trustee and staff education and training in order to maintain the highest standards of fiduciary accountability. Trustees are required to complete eight hours of investment and fiduciary training each year and to attend at least one educational conference every other year that will better enable trustees to perform their fiduciary duties.

Chargebacks

Finance

In July 2005, ERS technology operations were integrated with the CAS-IT Department in an effort to establish cross training, back up and enhanced services for the ERS and CAS-IT. The ERS reimburses Finance through a chargeback for these services in an amount of \$47,200. The Board continues to maintain Commission standards for hardware, software, security and access control provided funds are available.

Legal

The Commission's General Counsel's office provide legal services to the ERS in the areas of contract review and negotiation, litigation oversight, employee appeals and general plan advice. The ERS reimburses the General Counsel's Office through a chargeback of \$64,200 for these services.

Capital Outlay

There is no Capital Outlay anticipated in FY2014. During fiscal years FY2010, FY2011, and FY2012, the ERS upgraded workstations, hardware for ePersonality, and replaced servers and the high speed printer.

FY2014 Investment Services

Attachment 2 estimates fees for bank custodial services provided by The Northern Trust Company of Chicago, Illinois; investment consulting services provided by Wilshire Associates of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania; an independent investment consultant to monitor the private equity allocation; and investment management services provided by investment managers investing in domestic equities, international equities, fixed income, alternatives, real estate and high yield income. Investment manager fees fluctuate based on the market value of the portfolio. Estimated fees are based on the December 31, 2012 portfolio value of \$687,407,000. The estimated fees assume a 7.5% return for 2013 and 2014 with fees estimated at 40 basis points.

SUBJECT: Resolutions for Compensation and Benefit adjustments and to authorize the amount of the Employer Contribution for prefunding the Other Post-Employment Insurance Benefits Program Trust Fund.

Recommendation: Approve the attached Commission resolutions related to compensation and benefit actions summarized below and the amount of the prefunding portion of the Employer's Contribution for Retiree Group Health Insurance to be paid to the Section 115 Trust in Fiscal Year 2014.

Background: During the May Commission meeting, Commissioners adopted Resolution #13-04 Collective Bargaining Agreement for Service/Labor, Trades, and Office Units of the United Food and Commercial Workers Local 1994/ Municipal and County Government Employees Organization (MCGEO). In addition, the Commission approved salary adjustments as presented in a memorandum for nonrepresented employees to be formalized by resolutions in June. Finally, our Post-Retirement Insurance Benefits Program Trust Agreement (for prefunding Other Post-Employment Benefits), requires that contributions to the Trust be obligated by resolution. Below is a short summary of each Resolution. The bolded language reflects points of clarification to information presented in May.

Resolution #13-07 Fiscal Year 2014 Merit/Anniversary and Re-Hire Wage Adjustments for Non-Represented (Merit System and Contract) Employees

Anniversary (Merit) Increase for Merit System Employees

The attached resolution provides for a maximum 3% anniversary increase for merit employees. The resolution provides for an exception to the Merit System Rules and Regulations, Chapter 1200 which awards an anniversary (merit) increase not to exceed 3.5% for successful job performance. Lowering the merit increase by .5% for Fiscal Year 2014 enabled the Commission to set the Fiscal Year 2014 COLA .5% higher so employees at top of grade could receive more in their base pay.

Anniversary Increase for Seasonal/Intermittent and Term Contract Employees –

The Commission approved a maximum 3% anniversary increase for Seasonal/Intermittent and Term Contract employees for Fiscal Year 2014.

Pay Adjustment Upon Rehire for Seasonal/Intermittent Aquatics

The previously suspended step increases for aquatics seasonal/intermittent employees will be reinstated.

Resolution #13-08 Fiscal Year 2014 Cost of Living Adjustments (COLA) for Non-represented Merit System and Contract Employees

Merit System and Term Contract Employees -

Merit System employees that have reached the top of their pay grade as of July 1, 2013 shall receive a 3% COLA effective the first pay period after October 1, 2013. **The General Service**, **Select Career IT, Park Police Command Officers/Candidates Salary Scales will be adjusted to reflect the 3% COLA at the same time**. The other Merit System and Term Contract employees who have <u>not reached the top of their pay grade (as of July 1, 2013) will receive a 3% COLA added to their base pay as follows:</u>

- 1.5% will be added effective the first pay period after October 1, 2013
- 1.5% will be effective the first pay period after January 1, 2014.

The second 1.5% COLA is not to be compounded so all employees receive a 3% increase to base pay.

Seasonal/Intermittent, Seasonal/Intermittent Aquatics and Temporary Contract Employees The Commission also is providing a 3% COLA to these employees effective the first pay period after July 1, 2013. The associated pay scales will be adjusted at the same time.

Resolution #13-09 FY 2014 Cost of Living Adjustments for Service/Labor, Office and Trades Units (Employees represented by the United Food and Commercial Workers, Local 1994/Municipal and County Government Employees Organization (MCGEO))

The resolution provides for the 2.5% COLA adjustment to the salary scales for MCGEO represented employees. **The adjustment will be effective the first pay period after October 1, 2013.**

Resolution #13-10 Approval of FY 2014 Employer Contribution for Retiree Group Health Insurance.

The Commission's Fiscal Year 2014 Proposed Budget included total retiree healthcare funding of \$16,952,000 based on the July 1, 2012 actuarial valuation. The projected cost was allocated as \$10,572,000 for current retiree healthcare and \$6,380,000 for prefunding the Post-Employment Insurance Benefits Program Trust Fund. Commission staff forwarded additional historical information to the Actuary as the cost allocation did not appear reasonable. The valuation estimate for FY 2014 was subsequently revised to \$9,133,000 for current retiree healthcare and \$8,471,000 for prefunding for the Trust Fund for a total of \$17,604,000. As this information was provided too late to revised the total FY 2014 request, we recommend funding the current retiree healthcare at \$9,133,000 and the prefunding portion to the Trust at \$7,819,000 which is \$652,000 lower than the revised valuation. However, it should be noted that due to the prior changes to plan design and the cost sharing formula, we are far ahead of phasing in our

prefunding and instead of being at year 5 of 8, we are just about at full annual required contribution funding levels.

Resolution #13-11 Approval of Fiscal Year 2015 Amendments to Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission Employees' Retirement System Plans A & B.

Commission employees in plans A & B will increase their contributions to the pension plans by .5% of base pay effective the first pay period after July 1, 2014. Changes to the plans' language will be presented at a later date by the Employees' Retirement System staff. This change is being documented through resolution to enable the Actuary to take the change into account in preparing the next valuation which will provide the Employer Contribution to be used in the FY 15 Budget.

Staff will be present at the Commission meeting to address any questions.

WHEREAS, the Commission recognizes that non-represented employees have not received cost of living adjustments ("COLAs") or anniversary/merit increases for the past three years and that wage stagnation is not a prudent path toward excellent public service; and

WHEREAS, Commission Practice 2-16 and Administrative Procedures 00-02 allows for the award of pay increments for Seasonal/Intermittent and Term Contract employees assigned to the General Service or Intermittent Pay Schedules in accordance with the Performance Evaluation System for Contract Employees; and

WHEREAS, Commission Practice 2-16 and Administrative Procedures 00-02 allow employees assigned to the Seasonal/Intermittent Aquatics Pay Schedule to receive a step increase to the next level upon being re-hired and attaining a "satisfactory" performance evaluation; and

WHEREAS, on March 25, 2010, the Commission suspended the provisions of Commission Practice 2-16 and Administrative Procedures 00-02 concerning pay increments and step increases for all Seasonal/Intermittent Contract and Term Contract employees indefinitely by passing Resolution 10-04, *Suspension of Pay Adjustments for Seasonal/Intermittent Employees*, which continues to be in effect; and

WHEREAS, the Commission's Merit System Rules and Regulations, Chapter 1200, Employee Compensation, awards an anniversary (merit) pay increment, not to exceed a 3.5% increase in base pay, for successful job performance to non-represented, Merit System employees; and

WHEREAS, the Commission suspended anniversary (merit) pay increments for non-represented Merit System employees for fiscal years 2011, 2012 and 2013 in Resolutions 10-11, 11-09 and 12-14, respectively; and WHEREAS, the respective County Councils on May 9, 2013 reviewed and together acted to approve the Bi-County budget items allocable to both counties, which with regard to compensation and benefit adjustments authorized compensation adjustments within the total dollars proposed by the Commission; and

WHEREAS, on May 15, 2013 the Commission approved changes to compensation for non-represented employees to enable up to a 6% wage adjustment, which will be achieved through a merit/anniversary increment of up to 3% and a COLA of 3% as described in Resolution 13-08, *Fiscal Year 2014 Cost of Living Adjustments for Non-Represented (Merit and Contract) Employees*;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission hereby reinstates the provisions of Commission Practice 2-16 and Administrative Procedures 00-02 concerning pay increments and step increases; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission hereby adopts a reduction of the FY 2014 maximum anniversary (merit) pay increment to 3.0% for all non-represented Merit System, Seasonal/Intermittent Contract and Term Contract employees; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission does hereby authorize the Executive Director to take action as may be necessary to implement this resolution.

- 1) Employees in the General Service, Select Career IT and Park Police Command / Candidate Pay Schedules;
 - a) Effective the first pay period following October 1, 2013, non-represented employees <u>who</u>, as of July 1, 2013, have not reached the maximum compensation for their compensation grade level shall receive a COLA equal to 1.5% of base pay at July 1, 2013; and

- b) Effective the first pay period following January 1, 2014, non-represented employees who, as of July 1, 2013, have not reached the maximum compensation for their compensation grade level shall receive a COLA equal to 1.5% of base pay at July 1, 2013; and
- c) Effective the first pay period following October 1, 2013, non-represented merit employees who, as of July 1, 2013, have reached the maximum compensation for their compensation grade level shall receive a 3.0% COLA; and
- 2) Employees in the Seasonal/Intermittent and Seasonal/Intermittent Aquatics Pay Schedules:
 - a) Effective July 1, 2013, all non-represented employees shall receive a 3% COLA; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that effective October 1, 2013, the General Service, Select Career IT and Park Police Command / Candidate Pay Schedules shall be revised to reflect the 3% increase in compensation due to the COLA; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that effective July 1, 2013, the Seasonal/Intermittent and Seasonal/Intermittent Aquatics Pay Schedules shall be revised to reflect the 3% increase in compensation due to the COLA; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that upon the effectiveness of the changes all previous versions of these pay schedules shall be rescinded; and

FISCAL YEAR 2014 COST OF LIVING ADJUSTMENTS FOR SERVICE/LABOR, OFFICE AND TRADE UNITS

WHEREAS, Title 16, Subtitle 2 of the Land Use Article of the Annotated Code of Maryland (the "Code") requires the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission (the "M-NCPPC") to engage in collective bargaining for certain employees and under specified circumstances; and

WHEREAS, eligible Merit System M-NCPPC employees are organized into the Service/Labor, Office and Trade Bargaining Units and have elected the United Food and Commercial Workers, Local 1994, Municipal and County Government Employees' Organization (MCGEO) to be their exclusive representative for the purpose of collective bargaining with the Commission; and

WHEREAS, THE Commission adopted the collective bargaining agreement with MCGEO on May 15, 2013 by Resolution 13-04, *Adoption Of The Collective Bargaining Agreement For Service/Labor, Office And Trade Units*; and

WHEREAS, the collective bargaining agreement included provisions for the payment of phased-in cost of living adjustments ("COLAS") for employees represented by MCGEO; and

WHEREAS, the respective County Councils on May 9, 2013 reviewed and together acted to approve the Bi-County budget items allocable to both counties, which with regard to compensation and benefit adjustments authorized compensation adjustments within the total dollars proposed by the Commission; and

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission hereby adopts a 2.5% COLA for employees in the following Pay Schedules:

- 1. Service/Labor Bargaining Unit;
- 2. Trades Bargaining Unit;
- 3. Office/Clerical Bargaining Unit; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the 2.5% COLA for employees represented by MCGEO be implemented as follows:

- 1) Effective the first pay period following October 1, 2013, employees represented by MCGEO who, as of July 1, 2013, have <u>not</u> reached the maximum compensation for their compensation grade level shall receive a COLA equal to 1.25% of base pay at July 1, 2013; and
- 2) Effective the first pay period following January 1, 2014, employees represented by MCGEO who, as of July 1, 2013, have <u>not</u> reached the maximum compensation for their compensation grade level shall receive a COLA equal to 1.25% of base pay at July 1, 2013; and
- 3) Effective the first pay period following October 1, 2013, employees represented by MCGEO who, as of July 1, 2013, have reached the maximum compensation for their compensation grade level shall receive a 2.5% COLA;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that effective October 1, 2013, the Service/Labor Bargaining Unit, Trades Bargaining Unit and Office/Clerical Bargaining Unit Pay Schedules shall be revised to reflect the 2.5% increase in compensation due to the COLA; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that upon the effectiveness of the changes all previous versions of these pay schedules shall be rescinded; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission does hereby authorize the Executive Director to take action as may be necessary to implement this resolution.

APPROVAL OF FISCAL YEAR 2014 EMPLOYER CONTRIBUTION FOR RETIREE GROUP HEALTH INSURANCE

WHEREAS, the Commission as "Plan Sponsor" entered into an Amended and Restated Post-Retirement Insurance Benefits Program Trust Agreement as of July 1, 2007 ("the Agreement"); and

WHEREAS, Section 1.1 of the Agreement states that the Plan Sponsor shall contribute such amounts as it deems necessary, in its sole discretion, from time to time, to meet its benefit obligations under the Group Health Insurance Plan ("Plan"). Contributions shall be made to the Trust Fund ("Section 115 Trust Fund") on a periodic basis or in a lump-sum in the discretion of the Plan Sponsor. The Plan Sponsor shall not be required to make contributions unless (and only to the extent) it has obligated itself to do so by resolution; and

WHEREAS, although the Commission expects to continue the Group Health Insurance Plan (the "Plan"), but it is the Commission's position that there is no implied contract between employees and the Commission to do so and that the creation of a retiree health benefit was not the product of collective bargaining negotiations. Therefore, the Commission reserves the right at any time and for any reason to amend or terminate the Plan, subject to the needs of the Commission and subject to any applicable collective bargaining; and

WHEREAS, the Plan Sponsor engaged Boomershine Consulting Group, L.L.C. ("the Actuary") to prepare a Retiree Healthcare Programs Actuarial Valuation as of July 1, 2012; and

WHEREAS, the Retiree Healthcare Programs Actuarial Valuation as of July 1, 2012 initially projected a Fiscal Year 2014 Employer contribution totaling \$16,952,000 consisting of \$10,572,000 for current retiree healthcare and \$6,380,000 for prefunding the Section 115 Trust Fund; and

WHEREAS, based on historical retiree healthcare costs, the Plan Sponsor provided additional retiree healthcare information to the Actuary and the Actuary revised the amount of the Employer contribution to \$17,604,000 consisting of \$9,133,000 for current retiree healthcare and \$8,471,000 for prefunding the Section 115 Trust Fund; and

WHEREAS, the total revised actuarial Employer contribution was increased by \$652,000 and was received too late to be incorporated in the FY 14 Adopted Budget and, as a result, the employer contribution amount for prefunding the Section 115 Trust Fund has been reduced by \$652,000 to \$7,819,000;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Commission as Plan Sponsor approves a \$9,133,000 payment to the Group Insurance Fund for current retiree healthcare and a \$7,819,000 payment to the Section 115 Trust Fund, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission does hereby authorize the Executive Director and other officers to take action as may be necessary to implement this resolution.

WHEREAS, the Commission ratified those certain changes to the retirement Plans for MCGEO by Resolution 12-11, Adoption Of The Collective Bargaining Agreement For Service/Labor, Office And Trades Units, and Resolution 13-04, Adoption Of The Collective Bargaining Agreement For Service/Labor, Office And Trades Units; and

WHEREAS, adopting similar retirement plan changes for the Commission's nonrepresented employees is needed to fully realize the economic benefit of changes to the Plans; and

WHEREAS, the Commission desires to memorialize those certain changes to the retirement Plans for MCGEO, as well as, adopt changes to the retirement Plans for unrepresented employees;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission does hereby modify the terms of Plans A and B (for represented and non-represented Merit System employees) to increase the employee retirement contribution by one-half of one percent (.5%) of base pay, effective July 1, 2014.

Recommendation:

Approve Resolution No. 13-14 - "Adoption of the FY 2014 Commission Operating Budget"

Background:

Pursuant to the Land Use Article, of the Annotated Code of Maryland, the Commission submitted its Proposed Budget to the County Executives of Prince George's County and Montgomery County on January 15th. In accordance with the Land Use Article, each County Council has approved that portion of the Commission budget allocated to its county. On May 23, 2013, Montgomery County Council adopted resolution 17-765. On May 30, 2013, the Prince George's County Council approved bill CB 41-2013. Further, both Councils on May 9, 2013 approved those portions of the Commission budget allocable to both counties.

Resolution No. 13-14, "Adoption of the FY 2014 Commission Operating Budgeting" adopts the budget for FY14 including the additions, deletions, increases, and decreases from the submitted Proposed Budget as approved by the respective County Councils of Montgomery County and Prince George's County.

The Adopted Budget totals \$425.70 million excluding reserves, ALARF, and Internal Service Funds. Compared to the FY13 Adopted Budget, the FY14 Budget is about \$31.1 million higher. In Prince George's County, the budget is increasing by nearly 11 percent for FY14, primarily as a result of reinvesting fund balances to meet critical infrastructure, maintenance, public safety, and core service needs, as well as to augment employee compensation. Despite a continuing decline in the assessable base, the tax rates for FY14 remain the same as the FY13 rates. In Montgomery County, the budget is increasing by nearly 2 percent for FY14. As in Prince George's, the use of fund balances allowed for employee compensation improvements as well as investment in essential needs and infrastructure. Montgomery County's assessable base has stabilized – real property is slightly higher; personal property is lower. In addition, the County Executive proposed and the Montgomery Council approved a small Park Fund tax rate decrease. Exhibit 1 provides a comparative summary of the FY14 Adopted Budget for each county.

Summary of Adjustments in the FY14 Adopted Budget

The FY14 budgets as approved by the respective County Councils included the following adjustments from the Proposed Budget.

Montgomery County Adjustments from Proposed

Administration Fund

- ✓ Added \$254,840 to the Functional Planning & Policy (FPP) division of the Planning Department to fund staff support to the Montgomery County Historic Preservation Committee. Direct County funding to the Special Revenue Fund for this purpose was eliminated.
- ✓ \$100,000 proposed for BRT Implementation in FPP was eliminated and redirected to Area 1 to expedite the Bethesda Minor Master Plan Amendment.
- ✓ \$50,000 proposed in the Center for Research and Information Systems division for a Garden Apartment Lifecycle and Redevelopment study was not approved.

- ✓ The proposed transfer of \$950,000 to the Development Review Special Revenue Fund was not approved.
- ✓ Increased the salary dollar marker for compensation adjustments and distributed that and the proposed salary dollar marker from the non-departmental account to each division's operating budget.
- ✓ Property tax revenues have been adjusted to reflect the February 2013 estimates issued by Montgomery OMB. These estimates are slightly lower than the November 2012 estimates used in the Proposed Budget.

Park Fund

- ✓ Added \$28,000 and \$15,000, respectively, to the Park Planning and Stewardship and Facilities Management divisions for increased deer management.
- ✓ Increased the salary dollar marker for compensation adjustments and distributed that and the proposed salary dollar marker from the non-departmental account to each division's operating budget.
- ✓ The County Executive recommended and the Council approved a \$0.001 tax rate decrease in the Park Fund.
- ✓ Property tax revenues have been adjusted to reflect the February 2013 estimates issued by Montgomery OMB. These estimates are slightly lower than the November 2012 estimates used in the Proposed Budget.

Enterprise and Property Management Funds

✓ Increased the salary dollar marker for compensation.

Special Revenue Fund

- ✓ Added \$81,000 for the renovation of historic park properties.
- ✓ Increased the salary dollar marker for compensation.

Prince George's County Adjustments from Proposed

Administration Fund

- ✓ Added \$200,600 in the Planning Director's Office for 2 new career positions: a Planner Coordinator and a Senior Visual Media & Imaging Specialist.
- ✓ Added \$300,000 in the Planning Director's Office for the implementation work associated with the Bowie State University/Bowie MARC Station Master Plan.
- ✓ Added \$50,000 to Support Services in the Planning Department to increase the project charge paid to the County Government for the People's Zoning Counsel.
- Increased the salary dollar marker for compensation adjustments and distributed that and the proposed salary dollar marker from the non-departmental account to each division's operating budget.

 Property tax revenues have been adjusted to reflect the March 2013 estimates issued by the State Department of Assessments and Taxation. These estimates are slightly lower than the November 2012 estimates used in the Proposed Budget.

Park Fund

- ✓ Added \$1,000,000 to the transfer to the CIP for the Artificial Turf Field and the Regional/Stream Valley Park Acquisition projects.
- ✓ Added \$2,300,000 to the transfer to the CIP for the Henson Creek Golf Course and Glassmanor Community Center projects.
- ✓ Increased the salary dollar marker for compensation adjustments and distributed that and the proposed salary dollar marker from the non-departmental account to each division's operating budget.

M-NCPPC RESOLUTION NO. 13-14 June 19, 2013

ADOPTION OF THE FY 2014 COMMISSION OPERATING BUDGET

WHEREAS, the Commission has prepared and submitted its proposed FY 2014 operating budget ("the Proposed Budget") to the County Executives of Montgomery and Prince George's Counties in compliance with the § 18-104 of the Land Use Article of the Annotated Code of Maryland, as amended ("Land Use Article"); and

WHEREAS, the respective County Councils have established work programs and made certain deletions and additions to the Proposed Budget which actions are set forth in the Montgomery County Resolution 17-765, and Prince George's County Bill CB-41-2013; and

WHEREAS, the County Councils on May 9, 2013 have reviewed and together acted to approve the Bi-County budget items allocable to both counties; and

WHEREAS, the respective County Councils have acted to appropriate as the Commission's FY 2014 Operating Budget ("the Operating Budget") certain expenditures, including those funded by grants, totaling in the aggregate \$129,566,516 allocable to the various sources derived in Montgomery County as set forth in Exhibit A hereto and \$296,134,362 allocable to the various sources derived in Prince George's County as set forth in Exhibit B hereto; and

WHEREAS, the Commission's FY 2014 Operating Budget includes Group Insurance Funds as set forth in Exhibit C, which are Commission-wide Internal Service Funds funded through the operating department appropriations made by the respective County Councils for Montgomery County and Prince George's County; and

WHEREAS, the Commission does hereby delegate to the Montgomery County Planning Board and the Prince George's County Planning Board for review of expenditure plans for departments, offices and divisions within the Commission and the allocation of funds in accordance with the Operating Budget and this Resolution;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Commission does hereby approve and adopt the FY 2014 Operating Budget as set forth in Exhibit A, Exhibit B, and Exhibit C hereto; and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Commission's Secretary–Treasurer and other officers are authorized to carry out financing for the Capital Equipment Internal Service Fund consistent with funding levels in the Operating Budget at such time and on such terms as they believe to be advantageous to the Commission without further action required by the Commission or either Planning Board; provided that the appropriate officers shall provide the Commission and each Planning Board subsequent notice of any action taken pursuant to this resolution; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Executive Director and Secretary– Treasurer are directed to establish the necessary controls to ensure compliance with the § 18-109 of the Land Use Article, which provides that no expenditure of funds shall be made or authorized by the Commission in excess of the approved budget amounts plus 10% thereof for each park and recreation project and for each administration or operating department or function of the Commission, and for each planning project contained in the planning work program for each county, as set forth in the approved Council Resolutions, unless approved by either or both County Councils, whichever is appropriate, and which also stipulates that the Commission may not exceed the total approved budget for each of its Funds, except for Enterprise Funds, without the prior approval by either or both County Councils, as applicable; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in the event operational necessity requires that a budget amendment be made during the fiscal year, as outlined in § 18-108 of the Land Use Article and Budget Adjustment Practice 3–60, the budget amendment requires approval of the appropriate County Council. An amendment may change the total amount of the appropriation stated in the adopting resolutions of the County Council, or transfer more than 10% of appropriated funds from one appropriation to another. A budget may be amended by resolution by the respective county councils on their initiative or at the request of the Commission after receipt of recommendations from the respective county executives and after public hearing upon reasonable notice to the public. With respect to budget items applicable to both counties, an amendment is not effective unless it has received the concurrence of both county councils; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in the event operational necessity requires that budget adjustments be made during the fiscal year, as outlined in Budget Adjustment Practice 3–60, the officials and managers listed below are authorized to approve adjustments within or between budget appropriations for objects of expenditure or other levels of control within a department, division, office, or program under their direction, as those appropriations are set forth in the Operating Budget adopted by the respective County Councils and pursuant to this Resolution, provided however that any cumulative budget adjustments increasing budget control levels by an amount in excess of \$50,000 shall be reviewed and approved by the Commission and/or the appropriate Planning Board; and provided further that any budget adjustment which involves any change in the work program shall be reviewed and approved by the Commission and/or the affected Planning Board; and provided further that any budget adjustment which would result in the Commission exceeding the total approved budget for any of its Funds, except the Enterprise Funds, must have the prior approval of either or both County Councils, as applicable:

Executive Director Secretary–Treasurer General Counsel Director of Parks – Montgomery County Director of Planning – Montgomery County Director of Parks and Recreation – Prince George's County Director of Planning – Prince George's County Chair – Prince George's County Planning Board Chair – Montgomery County Planning Board; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Executive Director shall direct the Budget Office to provide to all members of the Commission and each administrator listed above a summary of a semi–annual budget adjustment report with cumulative adjustments for each controlling account as of the reporting date; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the transfer of funds between departments or administrative units as listed above as adopted shall require the approval of the Commission and/or the appropriate Planning Board; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Office of the Secretary–Treasurer and the Budget Office are authorized to review all budget adjustments and disapprove those budget adjustments for which funds are not available or which do not comply with law or Commission fiscal policies.

SUBJECT: MFD Purchasing Statistics— Third Quarter FY13

The Commission's procurement policy (Practice 4-10, Purchasing) includes an antidiscrimination component which assures that fair and equitable vendor opportunities are made available to minority, female or disabled owned firms (MFDs). This program is administered jointly by the Office of the Executive Director and the Purchasing Division and includes a price preference program and an MFD subcontracting component based on the Commission procurement practices and the available MFD vendors in the marketplace. The price preference program has been suspended until a MFD study is conducted to provide evidence that the price preference is/is not needed. This report is provided for your information and may be found on the Commission's intranet.

Some of the observations of this FY13 report include:

- Attachment A indicates that through the third quarter of FY13, the Commission procured approximately \$65.9 million in goods, professional services, construction and miscellaneous services. Approximately 24.7% or \$16.2 million was spent with minority, female and disabled (MFD) owned firms.
- Attachment B indicates that in the third quarter MFD utilization was 24%. The cumulative utilization through third quarter FY13 was 24.7%.
- Attachment C represents the MFD participation by type of procurement. The MFD participation for construction through the third quarter of FY13 was 32%. Attachment C also indicates that the largest consumers of goods and services in the Commission are the Prince George's County Department of Parks and Recreation and the Montgomery County Department of Parks. These programs significantly impact the Commission's utilization of MFD firms. The MFD cumulative utilization numbers for these departments through the third quarter are 29.2% and 18.4%, respectively.
- Attachment D presents the FY13 activity for the Purchase Card program totaling approximately \$6.4 million of which 2.6 % was spent with minority, female and disabled (MFD) firms. The amount of procurement card activity represents approximately 9.8% of

the Commission's total procurement dollars. One reason for lower MFD participation on the purchase card is that the cards are used with national retail corporations when a quick purchase for a maintenance job is needed. The purchase cards are also used for training registration in order to guarantee attendance.

- Attachment E portrays the historic MFD participation rates, and the total procurement from FY 1991 to third quarter FY13.
- Attachments F shows the MFD participation in procurements at various bid levels to determine if MFD vendors are successful in obtaining opportunities in procurements that require informal bidding and formal bidding. Based on the department analyses, MFD vendors do appear to be participating, at an overall rate of 21.5% in informal (under \$30,000) and 26.9% in the formal (over \$30,000) procurements. In the newest delegation for transactions under \$10k, MFD participation is 20.1%.
- Attachment H presents the total amount of procurements and the number of vendors by location. Of the \$65.9 million in total procurement, \$47.8 million was procured from Maryland vendors. Of the \$16.2 million in procurement from MFD vendors, \$12.8 million was procured from MFD vendors located in Maryland.
- Attachment I compares the utilization of MFD vendors by the Commission with the availability of MFD vendors. The results show under-utilization in the following categories: African American, Asian and Females. The amount and percentage of procurement from MFD vendors is broken out by categories as defined by the Commission's Anti-Discrimination Policy. The availability percentages are taken from the most recent State of Maryland disparity study dated February 17, 2011.
- Attachments J and K are prepared by the Department of Human Resources and Management and show the amount and number of waivers of the procurement policy by department and by reason for waiver. Total waivers were approximately 1.5% of total procurement.

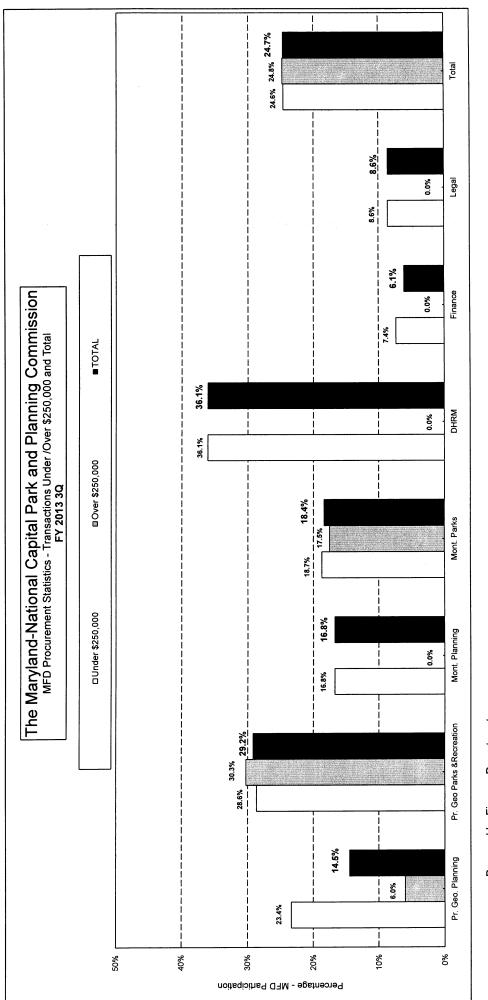
