- Chair Hewlett asked for a moment of silence for the victims and families of the Paris terrorist attack, and victims of any terrorist attack in the world.
- In honor of Veterans' Day, Chair Hewlett recognized the many veterans who have served and continue to serve the United States in the armed services.
- M-NCPPC is closing out its celebration of American Indian Heritage Month. The Prince George's County Department of Parks and Recreation opened its American Indian Village on the Piscataway River and Patuxent River Park and was very well received.
- The Commissioners welcomed Executive Director Patricia Barney back from extended leave.
- In recognition of National Hunger and Homeless Awareness Week (November 15th through November 22nd), the Prince George's County Department of Parks and Recreation is sponsoring a Teens and Jeans Walk-a-thon for the Homeless, on November 21st, at 11:00 a.m., in Bladensburg, Maryland.
- M-NCPPC will be sponsoring a Trot-for-a-Turkey on Saturday, November 21st to raise money to provide turkeys for families in need.
- The Prince George's County Department of Parks and Recreation opened its Wizard-of-Oz playground which has received landscape architect awards and recognition both nationally and internationally.
- The Commissioners thanked the Prince George's County Department of Parks and Recreation for bringing Art-O-Matic to the State of Maryland for the first time. Vice-Chair Anderson briefed the Commissioners on the award winners and the vision of Planning under the leadership of Director Gwen Wright. He stated the Awards not only recognize some of the most talented architects and developers in Montgomery County, but also raises the bar on standards expected in the future for new construction and development in the county.
- Commissioner Wells-Harley announced that this year marks the 25th anniversary of the signing of the Americans with Disabilities Act. On November 8th, the Montgomery Department of Parks, the Montgomery Department of Recreation, and the cities of Rockville and Takoma Park held a celebration in honor of this law
- Chair Hewlett announced Community Service activities in which the agency is involved. These will take place from November 9th to November 20th to support the community through So Others Might Eat (SOME), A Wider Circle Food, and New Socks and Washcloths drive. ITEM 5 <u>ACTION AND PRESENTATION ITEMS</u>

- a) Awards and Photos with Commissioners
 - 1) FY2014 CAFR Award (Zimmerman/Walsh) Chair Hewlett presented the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting from the Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada (GFOA) which was awarded to M-NCPPC for its Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) for fiscal year ending June 30, 2014. This award is the highest form of recognition for governmental accounting and financial reporting. M-NCPPC is tied with the Chicago Metropolitan Water Reclamation District for the greatest number of times receiving this award, now totaling 41.
 - 1) FY16 GFOA Budget Award (Barney/Kroll) Chair Hewlett presented the Government Finance Officers Association's (GFOA) Distinguished Budget Presentation Award received by the M-NCPPC for its annual budget. This award program recognizes budgets that are rated proficient as a policy document, a financial plan, an operations guide, and a communication's device. M-NCPPC has received this award for its 30th consecutive year.

b) Pension Actuarial Valuation Presentation (Rose)

Employees' Retirement System (ERS) Administrator Andrea Rose introduced actuary David Boomershine from Boomershine Consulting Group. Ms. Rose stated they were presenting on behalf of the ERS Board of Trustees a recommendation for the Employer Contribution to the Employees' Retirement System for Fiscal Year 2017. Each year the Board requests an actuarial valuation on the funding requirements to the ERS. Mr. Boomershine explained that when his group conducts an actuarial valuation, four primary components are used in the model: employee demographics, assets in the plan, plan provisions, and actuarial assumptions used for future projections.

Mr. Boomershine stated that the recommended contribution for Fiscal Year 2017 is in the Amount of \$20,268,189. Mr. Boomershine also explained the 5-Year contribution projections as contained in the packet. He noted the Funding Basis using Actuarial Value of Assets increased from 87.2% to 93.5%, and the Accrued Benefit Basis using the Market Value of Assets increased from 99.3% to 99.7%. Mr. Boomershine also presented contribution projections which ranged from \$20.27 million for FY17 to \$24.92 million for FY21.

With regards to the plan assets, Commissioner Presley questioned what caused the decrease in the investment return, to which Mr. Boomershine responded that the

investment returns are consistent with trends experiences by other pension plans across the country, as the market returns did not do well last year. Mr. Boomershine also explained the new standards 67 and 68, as issued by the Government Accounting Standards Board.

Following the presentation, Executive Director Barney explained that the multiyear actuarial projections presented today assume a 7.25% return. Changes in the market affect the return rate, and consequently the overall pension assets and employer contribution. If the market has a downturn, the fund can become less than 90% or 100% funded. Years ago, the agency had a contribution ratio of \$34 million. This was the result of significant downturns in the investment market. Ms. Rose noted that after an agency gets above 90% funded, the employer contribution becomes more volatile.

c) Recommendation to Approve an Employer Contribution for Pension Plan
In the Amount of \$20,268,189 for Fiscal Year 2017
Executive Director Barney confirmed the recommended contribution for the Pension Plan was \$20,268,189.

d) Appointment of the Carlyle Group as the new Private Real Assets Manager for the M-NCPPC Employees' Retirement System (Rose)

Ms. Rose presented a recommendation to approve the Carlyle Group as a new Private Real Assets Manager for the M-NCPPC Employees' Retirement System. The firm will manage a custom \$90 million dollar strategy for the ERS. This is the first time the ERS has been able to conduct a custom strategy due to the large allocation the agency is providing. The allocation has increased from 5% in 2007 to 15% in 2015. The custom strategy allows for continued commitments after the initial 3-year commitment, providing for implementation efficiencies, reduced fees, monitoring and ongoing due diligence.

- (e-f) Corporate Policy and Management Operations Division Chief Anju Bennett requested the Commission's review of policy amendments affecting Merit System and Contract employees.
 - e) Final Policy Guidance Implementing the Commission's Decision on Family Medical Leave Act Program (Merit System Rules: Section 1640) (Bennett/Thom-Grate)

Ms. Bennett presented the recommended amendments to the Merit System Rules and Regulations to incorporate implementation guidance for recent changes to the Family and Medical Leave Act (FMLA) Program. Ms. Bennett explained that in September, Commissioners adopted Resolution #15-17 to recognize changes to the FMLA Program. Staff is now asking the Commission to adopt the specific policy standards that will help the agency apply the

changes. She shared policy changes to the Merit System Rules and Regulations require the support of the Merit System Board. The Merit Board's letter of support is provided in the Commission packet. The Board's support is based on its review of proposals and a review of any comments which are submitted during the mandatory 30-day review by all non-represented employees. Two policy areas were recommended for approval:

- 1. Calculation of FMLA Eligibility Period: Move from Calendar Year to Rolling Year FMLA Leave Method
 Ms. Bennett explained that the agency will be moving to a rolling twelvemonth period for purposes of calculating an employee's eligibility period,
 effective January 1, 2016. Ms. Bennett noted that Executive Director
 Barney and M-NCPPC's bargaining team have already negotiated this
 change with the unions. Executive Director Barney added that although
 the change will be effective at the beginning of the year, employees will be
 entitled to the full FMLA benefit (of up to 12 weeks) in the first year. The
 leave taken in 2015 will not be counted toward the 2016 FMLA leave, thus
 employees will have a year to transition to this new calculation method.
- 2. Codification of Qualifying Exigency/Military Caregiver Leave Provisions The second policy change codifies the military leave benefits that the agency is already implementing. Ms. Bennett explained the Qualify Exigency Leave and Military Caregiver Leave provisions, as provided in the meeting packet. Commissioner Fani-Gonzales commended the agency for providing these benefits.

f) Recommended Amendments to Contract Employee Policies (Practice 2-16 to Address Vendor Transition and Applicability of FMLA/ACA (Bennett/Thom-Grate)

Corporate Policy and Corporate Records Manager Thom-Grate presented recommended updates to Administrative Practice 2-16 (Contract Employment) Seasonal/Intermittent, Temporary, and Term Employment for adoption. She informed the Commissioners that a broader review of Practice 2-16 is underway, but that the current proposed amendments are being presented for immediate adoption so they may be implemented by January 1, 2016. She reminded the Commissioners of Resolution #15-20 they adopted in October which implemented three new pay plans for vendors who converted to employee status. The proposed amendments focus on compensation equity, the implementation requirements of the Resolution, as well as communicate the agency's commitment to comply with applicable laws such as the Affordable Care Act, the FMLA, and workers' compensation laws, and clarify the existing overtime policies.

g) Discussion on the M-NCPPC Park Rules and Regulations Project (Gardner) General Counsel Gardner introduced Consultant Aisha Braveboy, Esq., who will be assisting with the Park Rules and Regulations (Park Rules) update. He stated the purpose of the discussion was to allow the Commissioners to provide input, at the beginning of this project, on changes to the agency's Park Rules. He shared that comments have been received from an employee survey of the Park Rules. He wanted to review those comments with the Commissioners so that direction can be provided to the project team. He shared updates must be adopted by July 1, 2016, due to smoking legislation which takes effect on that date. He noted that a transcript of this meeting would be created for the staff working on the rewrite so the project team would understand the Commissioners' perspective before preparing the next draft, and for posterity. Mr. Gardner stated the Park Rules were last updated March 2001. He provided a general overview of the current Park Rules, explained the impetus for the update, and legally required communications that must occur. Ms. Braveboy reviewed input submitted through the employee survey, as contained in the handout.

Areas Commissioners requested focus included:

- Significance of urban parks;
- Use of alcohol in the parks;
- Foundations/major fundraisers being made part of the scope of this project and in the thought process;
- Trends in recreation pursuits in terms of acceptable/permissible activities so standards encourage use by patrons; and
- Benchmarking against other agencies/jurisdictions

General Counsel Gardner added that other areas that will be reviewed include regulation of open space, 1st Amendment rights, managing public/private partnerships, and accommodations for transgendered individuals.

Following the presentation, General Counsel Gardner reviewed the next steps which must take place no later than April to complete the process by July 1:

- Scheduling of a meeting of the workgroup which will develop a draft that will be ready for public comment;
- Joint public hearing by the Commissioners;
- Formal promulgation of the Park Rules; and
- Posting and publishing of the Park Rules

2) 115 Trust FY2014

This report shows where the agency invests money for the future payment for Other Post-Employment Benefits insurance for retirees. M-NCPPC is approximately 13% to 14% funded for the end of this year for the entire liability. Compared to the agency's peers, M-NCPPC is a leader in the area of funding other post-employment benefits. This was not a stellar year for the investment performance; however, the agency's investment horizon for these funds is so long, that the ups and downs offset each other. There is no need for concern.

3) Investment Report (June 2015)

Mr. Zimmerman shared that the agency has reached a point with the new software that it can now reinstitute investment reporting and get it on a regular basis. For June 2015, the agency has earned 38 basis points of return. Laws restrict investment options which limits the ability to make money, but does meet the prime objective to preserve public funds.

Discussion	a) Enterprise Resource Planning (Zimmerman) Secretary-Treasurer Zimmerman provided an update on Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP). The implementation of the Affordable Care Act module, by INFOR, was successful. The Health and Benefits team is getting the information it needs for the immediate requirement to offer coverage to certain employees. The software is able to address the reporting needs for the IRS Form 1095c. Executive Director Barney suggested an article be posted in the UPDATE newsletter, explaining the purpose of the IRS Form 1095c as the form will be given to employees who receive benefit coverage. Mr. Spencer will ask Benefits Manager Jennifer McDonald to write the article. The revised Employees' Retirement System (ERS) calculations have been installed. Incorrect ERS deductions were found for 40 career part-time employees. The problems are being corrected before payroll runs today. The document imaging project is about to launch. This project, with software being provided by consultant MHC, will provide document imaging to accompany requisitions as a first stage. The Accounts Payable check submission process will be revised. Mr. Zimmerman will have the timeline on this project by next week. It is critical that the Manager Self-Service/Employee Self-Service in the Human Capital Management module for records and onboarding employees be functional by early spring. The consultant will be coming next week to assist with planning
	Executive Director Barney shared the agency needs a project manager to focus on ERP. With other challenges, the current staff is not able to work on the ERP projects that the IT Council needs to have completed. A schedule is needed for the remaining projects, descriptions of each project so they can be prioritized, resource dedication, and goals and objectives. The IT Council has agreed to fill the project manager's position. In the interim, a Request for Proposal (RFP) for a project management consultant will be done. Savings from the unfilled project manager's vacancy will pay for the position; therefore, additional money will not be required. Executive Director Barney shared that at the IT Council retreat, the group voted to
	retain the federated model of the IT Governance. The federated model has the Chief Information Officer (CIO) reporting to the Chair, the Vice-Chair, and the Executive Director. The CIO oversees enterprise-wide projects, and the Chief Technology Officers (CTOs) have shared reporting to the CIO. The CIO position will be advertised. Executive Director Barney sent the draft class specification for the CIO position to the IT Council for review. Comments on the draft should be sent to the Executive Director. The position can be advertised although the IT Governance model has not been presented to the Commission. The federated model will focus

on implementation. Executive Director Barney expects the previous interview

process to be repeated again for this recruitment. That process consisted of the IT Council and CTOs conducting interviews, with the best three candidates doing presentations. Additional outreach may be needed to attract qualified candidates.

Management Self-Service/Employee Self-Service (MSS/ESS) will permit employees, in time for the next open enrollment season, to go online to enroll for benefits, and access their W-2s online. Executive Director Barney has asked INFOR for someone who can assist M-NCPPC with implementation of the MSS/ESS schedule. The right resources are needed for the implementation to take place before spring.

Executive Director Barney discussed a pilot currently in place in Montgomery County Parks. This pilot was in response to a request from the operating departments to have the ability to conduct online inquiries of human resource data. The pilot was started with Montgomery County Parks as they have a smaller population of employees. The Executive Director indicated that this will be rolled out to Prince George's County Parks and Recreation once feedback is received from pilot. She will contact Director Gathers with the date, which should be in January.

With regard to the hiring side of the HCM module, there are certain data fields that the recruitment tool NeoGov does not have for its interface with the ERP system. Those data fields will be passed to another module in the ERP system. The Human Resources staff will add more data, and then information will upload. More information will be provided once INFOR develops the task list for MSS/ESS and the automated personnel action process. Executive Director Barney anticipates the schedule to be completed in December, for delivery by April 1st as the agency starts hiring for seasonal employees in March.

b) Commission-Wide IT Initiatives Fund — Waiver of FY 16 budgeted payment and approval of projects to be funded by available cash (Barney)

Executive Director Barney presented a memorandum requesting approval of two recommendations supported by the Department Heads and the IT Council. As background, Executive Director Barney explained the agency budgets multi-year Enterprise-wide Information Technology projects in the Commission-wide Information Technology Initiatives Internal Service Fund (CWIT Fund). Each operating department shares in the costs for a particular project. An estimate is made based on a cost driver of what each departments' contribution must be into the fund. Over the past few years funds have built up in the CWIT Fund. Due to the fiscal environment and Montgomery County Government's request for a savings plan, the Commission's Montgomery County Departments requested a waiver of the FY16 payment to the Commission-Wide Information Technology Fund (CWIT).

The IT Council recommendations are as follows:

Recommendation 1:

Waive the FY16 budgeted payment of \$646,000 that the operating departments would normally make into this fund.

Executive Director Barney stated that of that \$2.7 million available cash balance, the IT Council wanted clarity on the priority of the current projects which were already placed in the budget, and the funds that would be spent. Before recommending the waiver, the Commission's IT Council reviewed the available funds and the critical projects planned as recommended by the Acting Chief Information Officer and the Departmental Chief Technology Officers.

Recommendation 2:

Support \$1.5 million use of the available cash balance on critical Commission enterprise-wide projects.

Executive Director Barney noted the projects listed in the memorandum, that are designated to be spent from the \$2.7 million, were included in prior year budgets, and that the contribution on those projects were driven by cost drivers that were agreed upon by everyone. She reviewed the project list on Page 2 of the memorandum, and stated that the IT Council will continue to monitor the available funds and recommend projects as those named on the list are completed and resources are freed up.

Executive Director Barney stated that at the IT Governance meeting, the group will discuss budget policies and obtain clarity. She asked if the request of waiver of the FY16 budgeted payment should be taken to the Commission. Chair Hewlett and Vice-Chair Anderson agreed there is no requirement to take this request to the Commission. The Executive Committee approved both recommendations; however, Chair Hewlett recommended that General Counsel Gardner provide an opinion on the matter.

Gregory M. Stump conducted an actuarial educational session covering the mechanics of pension funding, the causes of gains and losses and how to manage funding volatility.

Sunita Bhatia reviewed the results of the July 1, 2015 Actuarial Valuation which indicated the funded ratio of the actuarial value of assets to the actuarial accrued liability for benefits was 93.5%, which is up from 87.2% in 2014. As of July 1, 2015, the actuarial value of assets was \$830,052,104 and the actuarial accrued liability was \$887,487,374, which resulted in an unfunded actuarial accrued liability of \$57.435,270.

The July 1, 2015 actuarial valuation included economic assumptions adopted by the Board as follows: a change in the investment assumption from 7.3% to 7.25% with a corresponding decrease in the salary scale assumption to 2.75%; and, a change in the post-retirement cost-of-living adjustment assumption to 2.75% for benefits accrued until July 1, 2012 and 2.5% annually thereafter. The valuation also recognized employee contribution changes in Plans C and D.

In order to meet the funding objectives, a recommended employer contribution of \$20,268,189 (14.3% of covered payroll) is payable July 1, 2016 for fiscal year 2017. The recommended employer contribution decreased significantly from \$27,191,305 (20.1% of covered payroll) as of July 1, 2014 primarily due to actuarial asset gains, demographic gains and assumption changes.

MR. AFZAL made a motion, seconded by MS. WALSH to approve an employer contribution of \$20,268,189 (14.3% of payroll) payable July 1, 2016 for fiscal year 2017. The motion PASSED unanimously (8-0). (Motion #15-63)

Ms. Rose recognized Staff for their efforts in submission of the actuarial data to Boomershine Consulting Group and thanked Boomershine for working within the ERS' timeline.

5. REPORT OF THE ADMINISTRATOR

Presentation by Administrator, Andrea L. Rose

- A. Administrator's Report dated October 22, 2015
 - i. Comprehensive Annual Financial Report for Fiscal Years Ended June 30, 2015 and June 30, 2014

Andrea Rose presented the Administrator's Report dated October 22, 2015.

Ms. Rose noted Boomershine will be conducting an experience study and actuarial factor review in early 2016.

The 2015 Comprehensive Financial Annual Report (CAFR) was submitted to the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) for consideration of a Certificate of Achievement for Excellence

in Financial Reporting and preparation of the Popular Annual Financial Report for members is underway and near completion.

Ms. Rose reported a modified Annual Statement will be sent out to members this year. The modified Annual Statement includes the member's account balance, normal retirement date, age at normal retirement, step-down date, and credited service, including service from unused sick leave, but does not include an estimate of benefits at normal retirement. Given the interface issues resulting from the Commission's recent payroll implementation, the ERS was unable to include an estimate of benefits at normal retirement in this year's statements to members.

The ERS continues to be impacted by the Commission's ERP system. The interface issues are affecting the timely payment of retirement, termination and death benefits and the calculation of estimates for members. ERS staff are continuing to work with Commission staff to resolve these issues.

Ms. Rose introduced the ERS' new Retirement Benefits Analyst, Eleanor Dagirmanjian. Eleanor's extensive experience includes 18 years with Aon Consulting as an Actuarial Analyst; a brief stint with the Maryland State Retirement System and the last 5 years as an Adjunct Mathematics Professor for two community colleges.

Ms. Rose notified the Board that Andrew Junkin was promoted to President of Wilshire Consulting effective October 15, 2015, replacing Julia Bonafede who is leaving Wilshire after 24 years to pursue new interests. Andrew joined Wilshire in 2005 and assumed the role of Managing Director in 2006. He is a member of Wilshire Consulting's Investment Committee and was named to the Board of Directors earlier this year, Mark Brubaker was also named to the Board of Directors in October 2015. Mr. Brubaker and Mr. Baker assured Ms. Rose there would be a seamless transition with no effect on the consulting services provide to the ERS.

MR. AFZAL reported on the conference he attended hosted by the ERS' investment manager, Principal Global Investors.


