d) Resolution 16-29 – Commission's FY 2018 Proposed Operating and Capital Budget (Kroll) Corporate Budget Manager John Kroll presented for approval, Resolution #16-29 – FY 2018 Proposed Operating and Capital Budget. Mr. Kroll provided a summary stating that the Proposed Budget Resolution for FY18 reflects the Proposed Budgets approved by each Planning Board, as modified by a decrease in OPEB costs and other non-substantial adjustments. He stated the Proposed Budget totals \$469.8 million in funding excluding reserves, ALARF, Capital Projects and Internal Service Funds. Compared to the FY17 Adopted Budget, the FY18 Proposed Budget is \$23.3 million greater, for an increase of 5.2%. e) <u>Boomershine Presentation: Actuarial Valuation and Recommendation to Approve</u>
<u>Contribution for Pension Plan in the Amount of \$24,822,301 (Boomershine Consulting Group, LLC, and A. Rose)</u>

Employees' Retirement System (ERS) Administrator Andrea Rose introduced actuary David Boomershine from Boomershine Consulting Group. Ms. Rose stated they were presenting on behalf of the ERS Board of Trustees, a recommendation for the Employer Contribution to the

Employees' Retirement System for Fiscal Year 2018. Every year, the Retirement System has an actuarial valuation performed to determine the funding requirements. Mr. Boomershine explained that when his group conducts an actuarial valuation, four primary components are used in the model: employee census data, plan provisions, plan assets, and the actuarial assumptions used for future projections.

f) Comprehensive Annual Financial Report for the Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2016 (C. Lehman – SB and Company, LLC, and Walsh)

Secretary-Treasurer Joseph Zimmerman presented the CAFR for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2016. He commended the Accounting Division on their efforts in producing an excellent product. He also explained that M-NCPPC had a new external auditor, SB and Company LLC. Secretary-Treasurer Zimmerman introduced external auditor Chris Lehman, Partner with SB and Company, LLC, and M-NCPPC Finance Manager Barbara Walsh. Mr. Lehman stated that SB and Company, LLC completed the audit and issued a clean, unmodified opinion on the financial statements, which is the best opinion. Ms. Walsh presented highlights of the CAFR as contained in the meeting packet:

Executive Director Barney mentioned the difference in size of the Montgomery County Fund Balance and the Prince George's County Fund Balance of the M-NCPPC. She explained there is a difference in the way the two counties handle the M-NCPPC budget and the long-term fiscal plans. In Prince George's County, the tax rate was increased some years ago. There is a long-term fiscal plan that shows the planned spending of the funds over the six-year plan on Capital Programs, Debt Service, and other operating expenditures. The plan is reviewed by the Prince George's County Spending Affordability Committee.

In Montgomery County, the tax rate is adjusted every year along with the Montgomery County tax rate. In Prince George's County, the rate is set and remains stable for future years. The Prince George's County Government has the Tax Reform Initiative by Marylanders (TRIM), and does not adjust its tax rates every year.

ITEM 3 - DISCUSSION/REPORTS/PRESENTATIONS

Discussion

EOB Building Discussion (Barney)

Executive Director Barney distributed the EOB and EMG Feasibility Study Status Update (November 10, 2016). The document presents background on the Executive Office Building (EOB) and an update of the facility feasibility study that was initiated with consultant EMG Corporation. EMG specializes in real estate life cycle planning and management.

Executive Director Barney shared that a committee will be established to discuss what is important in location, building, etc., from M-NCPPC's viewpoint. Members of the committee will include M-NCPPC Officers, the Chief Information Officer, the Internal Audit Chief, CPMO Chief Anju Bennett, Commissioner Norman Dreyfuss, and Vice-Chair Betty Hewlett (attending by phone). A retreat is scheduled for next week for key leaders from Central Administrative Services and the Office of the Chief Information Officer to brainstorm ideas. These will be shared with Commissioner Dreyfuss and Vice-Chair Hewlett.

The results of the committee's work will be presented to the Commission throughout the project to obtain input and approval of decisions (such as building/location criteria, Program of Requirements, and other key work products).

CPMO Chief Bennett stated that the Planning Boards were briefed about the four-part feasibility study done on the EOB. That study addressed the current needs of the occupants and the cost to renovate the building to bring it to an efficient level to meet occupant needs. Chief Bennett highlighted the four phases of the study and provided the results as contained in the handout:

- Assessment of Current Property Condition 22 items required immediate attention. The most critical 18 items were addressed. The estimated cost was approximately \$700,000; but that cost was reduced, as internal staff completed the most critical repairs. Four large items require completion, with an estimated cost of \$2,319,317.
- Energy Assessment EMG assessed the EOB for most enhanced energy
 efficiency. Preliminary recommendations have been completed as part of the
 assessment of property conditions.
- 3. Space Use Analysis to make the building more efficient Phase 1 includes review of existing space use, required needs, and evaluation of potential options for redesign of available space. Office design expert Gensler, who was used by Montgomery County to evaluate space needs for the move to Wheaton, was used for Phase 1, which is complete. A meeting was held in November with Officers and Directors to discuss Phase 2 future staffing, program, and operation needs. Another meeting is scheduled for Thursday, January 5th, with leaders of each department to discuss future needs. Phase 3 was to be completed by Gensler to identify space design needs and associated costs for design and construction for EOB. Chief Bennett can provide a copy of the EOB survey of required office space to the Executive Committee if needed.
- 4. <u>Consideration of Relocation Options</u> To be completed in conjunction with Stage3. Gensler will share information about the space needs with EMG. EMG will work with CBRE (commercial real estate specialists) to conduct an analysis on the feasibility of staying with EOB and renovating the space, purchasing a building to meet operation's needs, or utilizing one of the available spaces on the market for a lease or purchase option.

At one time, there were some delays with Gensler or EMG in producing the space analysis. M-NCPPC expects a tighter timeline to determine the next phases with Gensler in moving the project forward. Executive Director Barney stated that if the project cannot be moved forward with Gensler, OKKS Studios, Inc. may be another option. Montgomery County Planning Director Gwen Wright stated, and Montgomery County Parks Director Mike Riley confirmed, that M-NCPPC used OKKS, Inc., to develop the POR and the outcome of that work was mediocre. Gensler had to do additional work to refine the piece. Director Wright will provide a copy of the final document to Executive Director Barney. Chair Anderson added that in viewing Gensler's presentations, their work is excellent, and the company has previous experience with the M-NCPPC. Executive Director Barney stated that based on the comments from the Directors, M-NCPPC will continue working with Gensler. The team will move forward and bring the EOB building discussion to the Commission for input and voting.

Chair Anderson mentioned that an analysis should be prepared to determine the value and potential for redevelopment of the EOB.

ITEMS NOT LISTED ON AGENDA

Updated Commission-wide Organizational Chart

Vice-Chair Hewlett requested that an updated Commission-wide organizational chart be developed. The chart should contain names, titles, locations, and telephone numbers of employees. Vice-Chair Hewlett will ask the Prince George's County side to provide her

with a detailed list of employees that should include Police Department employees. Chair Anderson asked that Division Chiefs' cell phone numbers be added to Montgomery County Planning's telephone list. Executive Director Barney noted that the employee listing on InSite will be updated, as well.

Update on Voices in the Dark

Vice-Chair Hewlett inquired about the financial assistance requested by presenters of the play, Voices in the Dark. She stated that another email was sent by Robbin Brittingham in December to that effect. Executive Director Barney stated she responded to the group that the M-NCPPC has resources to assist. Director Wright has spoken to the organizers of the play; however, she has not received a request for money. Executive Director Barney will forward Ms. Brittingham's email to the Directors for their contribution to the request for assistance with an additional \$18,000 in funding. The Directors agreed to contribute to the request.

There being no further business to discuss, the meeting adjourned at 10:38 a.m.

115 Trust (OPEB) Meeting Minutes PRA

The meeting was called to order at 8:35 a.m.

Minutes from the 6/15/16 meeting were motioned by Commissioner Anderson to be approved, seconded by Ms. Barney, and then unanimously approved.

Barry Bryant from Dahab Associates reported that the return environment in the second quarter ended June 30 was similar across different asset classes, with domestic stocks and bonds both providing 2%-3% return. Foreign equity declined 0.6% on the heels of the Brexit vote, with developed stocks down 1.2% and emerging market stocks up almost 1%. As a result, pension plan returns were tightly bunched in the 1%-3% range.

Against that backdrop, the Portfolio registered a 2.7% return vs. a median return for all public plans of 1.7%, ranking in the 4th percentile with 1st being the best and 99th being the worst.

Mr. Bryant said the superior returns resulted from manager performance and not asset allocation. The asset allocation return – from the indices used to judge performance of the active managers – was 1.3%, below the median. He indicated that the Portfolio's relatively heavy reliance on foreign equity resulted in the below-average performance of the asset allocation.

Manager returns, however, brought returns up. All the active managers outperformed their indices. The PIMCO All-Asset/All-Authority Fund, which had a poor three-year period 2013-2015, led the way with a 4.9% return. All three of the Schwab/RAFI equity funds beat their indices by wide margins. The PIMCO Unconstrained Bond Fund underperformed its benchmark, but only slightly.

The Portfolio has done very well this year, returning 4.7% in the first two quarters. Results have been weak over the intermediate 5-year period due to the reduction of risk heading into 2013, a very good year for equity. On a since inception basis, returns have been very

average, as the Portfolio was an all-equity strategy during the recovery from the 2008 bear market.

Moving forward, Mr. Bryant said he thought emphasis on foreign equity relative to many domestic pension plans would benefit the Portfolio as foreign equity was less expensive than domestic equity by most valuation measures.

Mr. Bryant noted that results for the first two months of the third quarter were very favorable, with a return of 4.2% for a 9.1% year-to-date return. Asset allocation was the major reason for this favorable return, he said, as SMid Cap domestic equity and foreign equity in which the Portfolio has above-average allocations both had stronger returns than other asset classes.

The committee next considered the Trust's first investment policy statement (IPS). Mr. Bryant noted that the IPS has a layered approach, with the process followed by the committee outlined in the first two pages, followed by the results of that process (the asset allocation and actuarial assumption), and then a page on the goals for each manager, and finally, a glossary. The committee adopted the IPS by unanimous vote.

Mr. Bryant reviewed the Trust's new real estate manager, Intercontinental Real Estate. He explained the various types of diversification in which the Trust engaged, the level and types of real estate and financial risk, and the strategy's current positioning. Abbey Rodman, Trust Administrator, noted that the capital commitment to Intercontinental had been fully met (\$832,054.87 on 6/17/16; plus \$3,777,945.13 on 9/12/16 = \$4,610,000.00) and now comprised about 10% of the Portfolio, with the balance of safety assets totaling about another 10% remaining in the PIMCO bond fund.

The committee next considered the concentration of assets with two vendors, PIMCO and RAFI. Mr. Bryant said that while PIMCO and RAFI were affiliated for marketing purposes, the two were separate organizations and largely unrelated regarding investment strategies across stocks (RAFI strategies) and bonds (PIMCO strategies). He added, however, that three of the Portfolio's four equity allocations were with RAFI, and that while each was in a separate segment of the equity market, all employed similar investment strategies. He noted that the PIMCO All-Asset/All-Authority fund invested in both RAFI equity strategies and PIMCO fixed income strategies.

Ms. Barney asked Mr. Bryant if Dahab could include returns net of fees, and Mr. Bryant said he would request that a page be added to the quarterly report to honor that request.

The committee decided that these concentrations were excessive. Mr. Bryant offered various alternatives to replace one of the RAFI allocations including consideration of active managers. Both Commissioner Anderson and Ms. Barney expressed skepticism that active managers could consistently add value. A decision was made to consider three traditional index funds to replace the RAFI large cap fund. The committee instructed Mr. Bryant to bring alternatives for it to consider at the next meeting.

Alternatives to the PIMCO UBF strategies were briefly discussed, but it was decided to deal with equity first.

The Trustees set 11:30 am on Wednesday, December 21, 2016 at MRO for the next meeting.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:35 am.

Thank you for the opportunity to lead the Diversity Council (Council) this past year. The purpose of this memo is to inform you of our major accomplishments for calendar year 2016. We are proud to report our accomplishments as follows:

 September 2016. This plan will guide the work of the Council for the next 3 years.
- Developed new marketing print pieces to promote the Diversity Council and its mission to internal staff and stakeholders including a creative rack card and poster. Promotional items have been distributed and will be placed in strategic Commission building locations.
- Developed a Diversity Council informational brochure to be included in the orientation packet for new Commission employees.
- Updated and maintained the Diversity Council website with information about the Council and its work progress.
- Re-instated the "Diversity Council Corner" in the employee newsletter, UPDATE. This
 included monthly articles of diversity celebrations and promote the work program of the
 Diversity Council to Commission employees and stakeholders.
- Organized and implemented the one Commission Women's History Month Celebration with the theme: "Working to Form a More Perfect Union: Honoring Women in Public Service and Government" held at the Newton White Mansion in March 2016. Included

in this celebration was a keynote speaker, dance presentation, donations of business clothing for the *Dress for Success* non-profit organization and donations to the *Family Crisis Center*.

- Supported and organized the one Commission Asian Pacific American Heritage Month Celebration with the theme: "Walk Together, Embrace Differences, Build Legacies". The informational programs included traditional, educational and interesting awareness activities for all staff to participate.
- Enhanced monthly Council meetings by inviting impressive guest speakers to educate
 Council members on diversity and inclusion. This included an educational session on
 Autism and other disabilities during Autism Awareness month in April; and celebrating
 LGBT month in June specifically highlighting the transgender community.
- Developed and implemented the first Diversity Council New Member Orientation for all new Council members to be educated in the mission and the work program of the Diversity Council.
- Updated the Commission-wide Diversity and Inclusion Survey to be distributed to all Commission employees in January 2017. Updates include appropriate questions that will assist the Council in gauging diversity awareness and diversity competence in employees. The results will be complied and presented at the diversity celebration in May 2017.
- Established the date, theme and overall program of the one Commission diversity event, entitled, "CONNECT... Celebrating Diversity and Inclusion" to be held on May 3, 2017 at the Clarice Smith Performing Arts Center at the University of Maryland, College Park.
